# 150 UKRAINIANS RETURNED FROM RUSSIAN CAPTIVITY IN FEBRUARY

On 5 February, a prisoner of war exchange took place. 150 Ukrainians returned to their homeland. Among the returnees are soldiers of the Navy, who were captured in Mariupol and Zaporizhzhia region, the Air Force, the Air Assault and Land Forces, the National Guard, border guards, territorial defence forces, and a police officer.

The exchange took place thanks to the work of the Coordination Headquarters for the Treatment of Prisoners of War, Ukrainian negotiators and the support of the international partners of the UAE.

## 4,131 UKRAINIANS

returned from enemy captivity as of 28 February 2025

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*‘Mum, I’m alive,’ were the first words of the Ukrainian defender released from Russian captivity.*



The Ombudsman’s Office was present at the scene to monitor the observance of human rights in accordance with international humanitarian law and the Geneva Conventions. The staff recorded the condition in which the released persons returned to Ukraine and informed them of their rights.



*The Ombudsman of Ukraine, Dmytro Lubinets, has published a communication with Russian prisoners of war before the exchange procedure. They confirm that they were treated humanely.*

In addition, on 15 January, the repatriation of seriously wounded and severely ill defenders of Ukraine took place. Our people have a number of illnesses, including tuberculosis, cancer and gangrene. There are Ukrainians with loss of sight, amputations and other injuries. There was also a civilian among the returnees. He was captured by the occupiers in the Kyiv region and unlawfully detained.



**Ukraine wants to bring all its citizens back home and continues to work for this!**

## **RUSSIANS EXECUTE UKRAINIAN PRISONERS OF WAR!**

Since the end of August 2024, the UN Human Rights Monitoring Mission in Ukraine has recorded 79 executions in 24 separate cases. Many Ukrainian soldiers who surrendered were executed on the spot. The Mission analysed photos and videos from Ukrainian and Russian sources showing executions or dead bodies. Such material was assessed as credible.



*These cases did not happen out of the blue. Russian public figures have openly called for the inhumane treatment and even execution of captured Ukrainian servicemen,” said Danielle Bell, Head of the Mission.*



# UKRAINIAN CHILDREN MUST BE AT HOME WITH THEIR FAMILIES!

On 14 February, 8 Ukrainian children were returned home and reunited with their families. Parents and guardians of the minors **appealed to the Ombudsman's Office** with a request to assist in the return of their children to their homeland.

Among those returned are siblings. All the children were separated from their families due to the war and occupation, some of them lost their parents. Overall, we managed to return children from Luhansk, Zaporizhzhia and Kherson regions.



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The return was carried out as part of the implementation of the approved Action Plan of the President of Ukraine **Bring Kids Back UA**. The return also involved a constant partner who has been helping to return Ukrainian children from deportation and forcible displacement for more than three years, **the intermediary country, the State of Qatar**.

Dmytro Lubinets, the Ukrainian Parliament Commissioner for Human Rights, expresses gratitude to this country for its assistance, which is a noble mission! The Ombudsman also thanks the Save Ukraine charity fund, which helped to reunite one family.

**For the first time in a long time, a civilian woman who had been unlawfully detained and convicted by Russians in the temporarily occupied territory of Ukraine could meet her two sons.**

The children's guardian was their grandmother. But now they are reunited with their mother! The woman was returned home in September 2024.

**After her release, she waited five months to be reunited with her children.**



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In addition, in February 2025, we helped **a mother and her eight children aged 5 to 17 return to Ukraine.**

This was part of the Bring Kids Back UA initiative of the President of Ukraine. This was achieved in cooperation with partner organisations, including the Save Ukraine team and the International Assistance Headquarters for Ukrainians.

## **WE HELP UKRAINIANS TO LEAVE THE OCCUPATION AND PREVENT DEPORTATION!**

Thanks to the coordinated work of the Ombudsman's Office, government agencies, humanitarian organisations and international partners, **17 Ukrainian citizens have been evacuated from the temporarily occupied territory since the beginning of 2025.**

**Among the evacuees:**

- **A family from the Kherson region** who lost their home after an enemy shelling;
- **An 87-year-old woman** who was forcibly deported to the Russian Federation, where she was left without proper care and access to vital medical care;
- **A guardian with a child** who were forced to live under occupation and were persecuted because the child's mother was a prisoner of the aggressor state;
- **An elderly couple** who could not leave on their own due to fear of being subjected to filtration measures and danger from the occupiers.

**Leaving the temporarily occupied territory is essential to avoid threats to the lives and health of citizens who are often subjected to persecution, pressure and restrictions by the occupation authorities.**



# RELATIVES OF UKRAINIANS HELD IN ENEMY CAPTIVITY MUST FEEL SUPPORTED!!

On February 18, Yuriy Kovbasa, Representative (Deputy) of the Commissioner for Human Rights in the System of Bodies in the Security and Defence Sector chaired a meeting with the families of the servicemen of the 152nd separate Jaeger brigade who are considered missing and captured. Yuriy Kovbasa underlined that everyone has the right to write an appeal to have our Office launch one of the mechanisms for finding particular defenders.



The Ombudsman of Ukraine, Dmytro Lubinets, held meetings with families of prisoners of war and missing persons in the following regions: Ivano-Frankivsk and Zakarpattia (Mukachevo). More than 1 500 people joined them.

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The meetings are important not only for discussing issues of concern to the families, but also for coordinating further actions aimed at bringing our heroes and heroines home," said **Dmytro Lubinets**.

# CHILDREN AFFECTED BY RUSSIAN AGGRESSION MUST BE PROTECTED!



The Ombudsman's Office and the Regional Human Rights Centre have **started filing individual complaints to the UN Committees** to seek compensation for the damage caused to Ukrainian children for violations of their rights by the aggressor country.



*During a separate event, the Representative (Deputy) of the Commissioner for the Rights of the Child, Iryna Suslova, the Representative of the UN Human Rights Monitoring Mission, Noel Calhoun, and legal expert of the Regional Human Rights Centre, Kateryna Rashevskya, discussed the peculiarities of individual complaints as a mechanism of international child protection.*

*The event was also attended by representatives of government agencies, member countries of the International Coalition for the Return of Ukrainian Children, the public and others.*

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**The Ombudsman's Office uses all available international mechanisms to hold Russia accountable for crimes against children.**

One of the areas of collaboration is cooperation with the UN Monitoring Mission, human rights organisations and civil society, which allows not only to record violations during interviews with the returned child, but also to create effective mechanisms for the protection and restoration of rights.



*The physical return of deported and forcibly displaced children is only part of the struggle. Our priority is to recognise Russia as a violator of the rights of Ukrainian children with relevant international legal consequences," says **Iryna Suslova**, Representative (Deputy) of the Commissioner for the Rights of the Child.*

**The decisions of the UN Committees can become the basis for further appeals to other international bodies, ensure the payment of reparations to children and the application of other compensation mechanisms.**

# HOW CAN UKRAINE ENSURE EDUCATION for children from the temporarily occupied territories? Special report presented

The Ombudsman of Ukraine, Dmytro Lubinets, presented a **Special Report on Access to Education for Children and Youth from the Temporarily Occupied Territories of Ukraine**. It was prepared on the basis of the work of experts, including representatives of the Ombudsman's Office, central executive authorities, NGOs, higher education institutions and students. *The Council of Europe Office in Ukraine assisted in the preparation of the document.*



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*Despite the challenges, in 2024, more than 11,000 children from temporarily occupied territories became students of Ukrainian higher education institutions. For comparison, in 2023, only 1,608 people were enrolled through educational centres. Such a significant increase is not just numbers, but the result of the hard work of our Office and representatives of NGOs," said the Ombudsman of Ukraine.*

**The special report contains 29 recommendations** for central executive authorities, as the situation of children and youth from temporarily occupied territories requires not only understanding, but also clear, coordinated and long-term actions. In this context, the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine recommended **to approve the Concept of Access to Education for Children and Youth from the Temporarily Occupied Territories**, which will allow the state to implement effective mechanisms to address the problems raised.

Dmytro Lubinets calls on all relevant agencies to carefully consider the recommendations in the document and ensure their implementation. He will personally monitor the implementation.



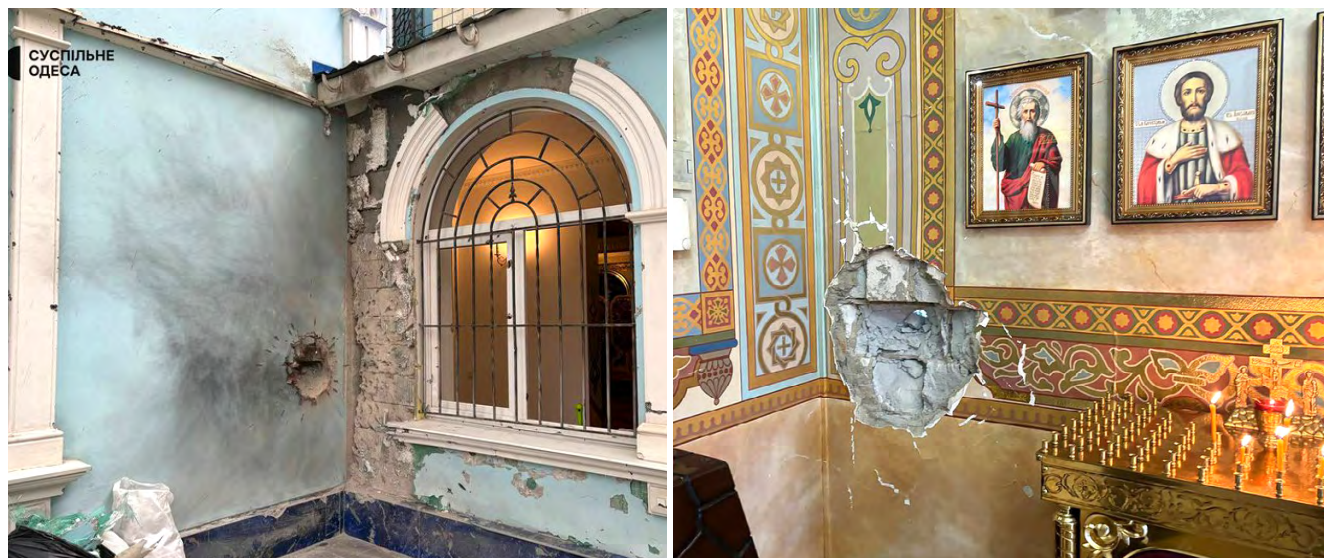

# UNESCO RESPONDS TO THE RUSSIAN ATTACK ON THE 'HISTORIC CENTRE OF ODESA'

Last year, the Ombudsman of Ukraine, Dmytro Lubinets, responded to the **Russian attack on Odesa on November 14**, which **damaged 21 architectural and urban monuments** located within the 'Historic Centre of Odesa' and its buffer zone. At the same time, he immediately **sent a letter to UNESCO**, where he pointed out the fact of the crime.

**The 'Historic Centre of Odesa' is included in the List of World Heritage in Danger.**



In return, **UNESCO responded to the Ombudsman's letter by condemning the Russian strikes** that damaged the historic buildings. The organisation also called for an end to attacks on cultural property protected by international law.

**UNESCO has conducted a remote damage assessment and sent a mission to Odesa** to assess the damage directly. The mission report is being finalised and will be submitted to the Ministry of Culture and Strategic Communications of Ukraine.

**“** *Russia is once again proving that it seeks to destroy Ukrainian culture and history by destroying cultural heritage sites. Russia is grossly violating Article 4 and Article 5 of the Hague Convention for the Protection of Cultural Property in the Event of Armed Conflict. In addition, Section VI of the 2003 UNESCO Declaration states that a state that intentionally destroys cultural heritage of great importance to humanity bears the responsibility for such destruction, to the extent provided for by international law, regardless of whether it is inscribed on the UNESCO list,”* said **Dmytro Lubinets**.

**! The international community must put pressure on the aggressor to stop attacks on sites of exceptional historical and cultural value to humanity!**

# RECORD MEETING OF THE WORKING GROUP: more than 60 participants from all over the world united for the return of Ukrainians

On February 13, the 8th meeting of the Working Group was held, co-chaired by the Ambassador of Canada to Ukraine, Natalka Cmoc and the Ambassador of Norway to Ukraine, Helene Sand Andresen.



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The meeting was attended by the largest number of participants ever: representatives of embassies from 46 countries, 4 Ukrainian government agencies and 5 international organisations. Among them: OSCE, ICRC, Council of Europe, EU Delegation to Ukraine and UN Human Rights Monitoring Mission in Ukraine. Representatives of the public also joined the meeting.

One of the key issues is the implementation of the initiatives adopted at the Ministerial Conference in Montreal, which became a diplomatic platform for strengthening international support for the return of Ukrainians home.

The discussion areas included, in particular:

- collecting complete information about children, prisoners of war and illegally detained civilians and creating relevant registers;
- documenting war crimes;
- implementation of the 'Safe Routes Home' initiative, which aims to ensure the safe return of all Ukrainians illegally detained in Russia;
- ensuring that Ukrainian civilians and prisoners of war are treated with dignity by the Russian Federation in accordance with the Geneva Conventions. One of the necessary steps is access for the ICRC to places of detention of Ukrainians;
- one of the conditions for a just peace for Ukraine is the exchange of 'all for all', including illegally detained civilians and the return of all deported children;
- reintegration and psychological, social and legal support for returned children and adults.



# THE WORLD MUST KNOW ABOUT THE CRIMES OF THE RUSSIAN FEDERATION!

The Ombudsman of Ukraine, Dmytro Lubinets, conducted a visit to the United States of America. He held a series of meetings to talk about the crimes committed by Russians against Ukrainians, including prisoners of war, illegally detained civilians, deported and forcibly displaced children, and religious leaders.

## Dmytro Lubinets met with:

- representatives of the **US Commission on International Religious Freedom (USCIRF)**, which actively supports Ukraine and documents violations, including repression of religious communities in the temporarily occupied territories;
- **former US Ambassador to Ukraine, John Edward Herbst**, and representatives of public sector;
- **Director of the Office of Eastern European Affairs of the Bureau of European and Eurasian Affairs, Kevin Covert**. The meeting was held at the U.S. Department of State;
- joined the **'National Gathering for Prayer and Repentance'** event and met with the leadership of the Museum of the Bible;
- representatives of the **United States Institute of Peace (USIP)**. The Ombudsman is grateful to the 6th US Ambassador to Ukraine, William Taylor, for an important meeting and support of Ukraine;
- **Director for Eurasia and Europe at the Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights and Labour, Christopher Anderson**;
- took part in a reception with the participation of church leaders from Ukraine, Israel and the United States as part of **'Ukrainian week\_2025'**. His Beatitude Metropolitan Epifaniy of Kyiv and All Ukraine also joined the event.

Dmytro Lubinets had a speech **at the Ukraine Briefing and Reception**, which brought together Ukrainian religious and public figures from around the world, and also took part in the **International Religious Freedom Roundtable**. The focus of his speech was on the heinous crimes committed by the Russian Federation against religious leaders in the temporarily occupied territories of Ukraine and against the freedom of religion. Dmytro Lubinets noted that Russians illegally detain Ukrainian civilians, torture and kill them, and destroy religious sites. Since the beginning of the full-scale invasion, more than 630 of them have been destroyed.



**New achievements:**  
On March 11, 2025, the Ombudsman of Ukraine, Dmytro Lubinets, officially takes office as a member of the Board of the European Network of National Human Rights Institutions (ENNHRI).



## Also, the Ukrainian Parliament Commissioner for Human Rights:

- joined a special event at the Museum of the Victims of Communism in Washington, D.C., dedicated to the commemoration of the Martyrs of Communism;
- met with Lead Prosecutor Christiane Levesque, Director of the War Crimes Accountability Team of the U.S. Department of Justice;
- met with Oksana Markarova, Ambassador of Ukraine to the United States.



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*Russia is waging a hybrid war aimed at destroying Ukrainian statehood and our nation as a whole. Civilian infrastructure is systematically targeted by enemy attacks, resulting in the deaths of civilians, including children. Russia abducts Ukrainian civilians to the temporarily occupied territories of Ukraine, deports and forcibly relocates Ukrainian children. The world must know about these crimes!"* says **Ombudsman of Ukraine Dmytro Lubinets.**

## DOMESTIC VIOLENCE MUST BE COUNTERED!

The Ombudsman of Ukraine Dmytro Lubinets receives a number of appeals from citizens regarding violations of their rights. In particular, he was addressed by a Ukrainian woman whose right to protection from domestic violence had been violated. The woman stated that her ex-husband systematically committed psychological violence against her, which manifested itself in insults and threats of physical violence against the applicant and their child. She also reported that she had repeatedly appealed to law enforcement agencies, but the situation of domestic violence continued.

The Ombudsman immediately sent a request to the National Police of Ukraine and the regional military administration to verify the facts of domestic violence and take appropriate response measures. As a result of the Ombudsman's response, the information on the applicant's appeal was registered in the Unified Register of Pre-trial Investigations on the grounds of a criminal offence.

In addition, a commission of representatives of the authorities, law enforcement agencies and a paediatrician visited the victim's residence and informed her about the rights and social services she could use. The applicant was also informed about safety measures in cases of domestic violence and was offered accommodation in a crisis centre.



The Ombudsman's Office of Ukraine, with the support of the international non-governmental organisation Corus International, developed a brochure 'Violence is Hiding in Silence'.

It contains information about the concept of domestic violence, its types, manifestations and the assistance that a victim can receive.

### Rights of victims of human trafficking restored

While monitoring the media and social media, we detected a case of human trafficking. The law enforcement officers had allegedly exposed a man who had taken advantage of the person's vulnerable state and dragged the victim into this situation. At the same time, there was no information on the provision of assistance.

A request was immediately sent to the local executive authority with a request to take the necessary measures. As a result, the National Social Service Service granted the victim the status of a victim of human trafficking. This entitles the victim to free medical, psychological, social and legal assistance, as well as a one-off cash payment.

# HUMAN RIGHTS IN SOCIAL CARE INSTITUTIONS MUST BE RESPECTED!

During visits to places of detention by the National Preventive Mechanism (NPM) groups to social protection institutions, including psychoneurological institutions, **there were cases of illegal extortion or extortion of personal funds from inmates** to meet the needs of the institutions.

For example, **in the Vinnytsia region**, the purchase of items such as dichlorvos, sticky fly tapes and medicines at the expense of the inmates was detected. In some cases, inmates are forced to pay for the purchase of a coffin and a burial kit at their own expense.

**Extortion of personal funds is a gross violation of their rights.** Such actions by the administration of the institution indicate abuse of office. **This is in direct contradiction to the law**, according to which persons with disabilities from childhood who are in residential institutions under state support have the right to receive 25% of their own social assistance and to freely dispose of it. In fact, these amounts, which often do not exceed UAH 700 per month, are the only personal funds a ward can use at their own discretion.

**For each of the recorded violations, the Ombudsman of Ukraine sent submissions to the competent authorities** demanding to eliminate the violations and take response measures against the responsible persons.

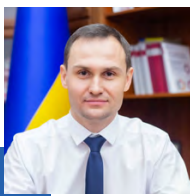
## OMBUDSMAN'S OFFICE PARTICIPATED IN THE EUROPEAN NPM FORUM

Representative (Deputy) of the Commissioner for Human Rights in Places of Detention Vitalii Nikulin joined **the European Forum of the NPM** 'Tackling overcrowding in European prisons: strengthening the role of NPMs in protecting human rights and ensuring effective oversight', organised by the Council of Europe.



**Overcrowding is the main cause of poor conditions of detention** and perhaps the most urgent problem facing penitentiary systems. Practical recommendations were offered to strengthen the NPM's advocacy role in promoting systemic reforms.

The Office has established bilateral contacts with NPMs in Europe for constructive interaction, exchange of experience and implementation of best practices.

## UKRAINE STRENGTHENS COOPERATION with European institutions in the field of personal data protection

Yuliia Derkachenko, Representative (Deputy) of the Commissioner for Information Rights, held a speech at the event of the German Society for International Cooperation (GIZ) 'The Role of Implementation of European Personal Data Protection Standards on the Path to European Integration' and presented the activities of the Ombudsman's Office in the field of personal data protection, the results of the European Commission's official assessment of the implementation of the EU law on personal data protection and participation in the GIZ Eastern Partnership Regional Fund for Public Administration Reform project.

Particular attention was paid to participation in the Data Protection Academy, which is held annually in Belgium, and the establishment of cooperation with the European Data Protection Board (EDPB) and the Office of the European Data Protection Supervisor (EDPS).

## PERSONAL DATA PROTECTION: strengthening our work

A conference on **Personal Data Protection in Law Enforcement** was held with the support of a Council of Europe project. The event was attended by Yuliia Derkachenko, Representative (Deputy) of the Commissioner for Information Rights.



### During the conference, the participants discussed:

- the reform of the legislation on personal data protection in the context of law enforcement activities, in particular, key changes and the impact of the new legislation on personal data protection on law enforcement activities;
- the updated Convention 108 and the Council of Europe's recommendations on the use of personal data by the police;
- the peculiarities of the protection of individuals with regard to the processing of their personal data by the police and criminal justice authorities and the free movement of such data (Directive (EU) 2016/680);
- the protection of personal data by the police and criminal justice authorities;
- the issues of transferring personal data via unsecured communication channels, prevention of illegal trafficking and processing of personal data.

**The main goal is** to raise awareness of the legislation in the field of personal data protection and to introduce the standards of the European Union.

# ENSURING THE RIGHT TO A FAIR TRIAL: main challenges and opportunities for improvement

At the invitation of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Stanislav Kravchenko, Ombudsman Dmytro Lubinets joined a meeting with the heads of the courts of appeal to discuss the state of administration of justice and problems with the functioning of the judiciary.



In 2024, the number of appeals to the Ombudsman's Office increased significantly, to more than 123,000 per year.

The issue of violation of citizens' rights to a fair trial and procedural rights is the second most frequent among all appeals to the Office, which demonstrates the relevance of this issue.

Ombudsman Dmytro Lubinets focused on the following issues:

- excessive length of court proceedings;
- overloading of courts and ensuring proper selection procedures;
- shortage of court staff and judges, which directly affects citizens' access to justice;
- logistical support of judges and remuneration of court staff;
- restoration of lost materials of criminal proceedings;
- effective cooperation between the Ombudsman's Office and the judiciary to ensure effective protection of the rights of Ukrainian citizens.



*I believe that a strong rule-of-law state is impossible without effective justice and an efficient human rights protection mechanism,"* said **Ombudsman of Ukraine Dmytro Lubinets**.

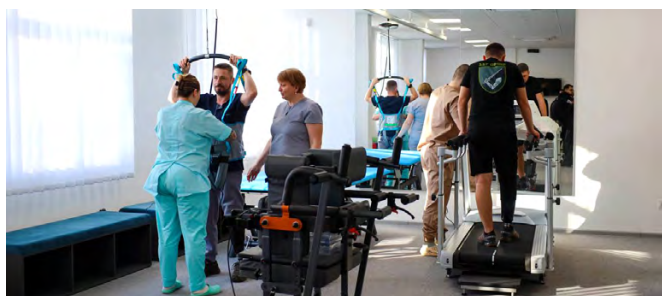

## REGIONS OF UKRAINE: strengthening human rights protection

Since the beginning of 2025, the Ombudsman's Office has been expanding its work in the regions. In particular, among the results and events:

- **A Human Rights Protection Centre was opened in Uzhhorod, Zakarpattia region.** This was made possible with the support of UNHCR and partner NGO NEEMIA. This is the seventh regional centre of this kind in Ukraine.
- The Ombudsman of Ukraine, Dmytro Lubinets, **visited the construction of housing for IDPs** – workers of relocated enterprises in Perechyn community in Zakarpattia.
- **A working meeting was held in Ivano-Frankivsk region with the regional authorities, where the Ombudsman introduced the new Representative in the region, Vitaliy Verbovyi.** This was followed by a discussion platform on the work of communities during the war with Members of the Ukrainian Parliament.
- In Ternopil region, Ombudsman Dmytro Lubinets **joined the opening of a new health and rehabilitation centre for the military and visited Mykulynets Regional Physiotherapy Rehabilitation Hospital, and in Zakarpattia he visited a military hospital.**





# THE AGGRESSOR STATE ATTACKS UKRAINE EVERY DAY!

Every day the Russian army continues to shell the territory of Ukraine and targets civilian infrastructure. Donetsk, Kharkiv, Zaporizhzhia, Poltava, Dnipro, Kyiv, Sumy, Odesa and other regions are under attack.

**On 1 February** in the morning, a Russian missile hit a residential building in Poltava. According to the Office of the Prosecutor General, 14 civilians were killed in the attack, including three children aged 7, 9 and 12.



The photo shows 9-year-old Sofia and her mother Olena. They died as a result of a rocket attack on Poltava. Sofia's father and Olena's husband, Dmytro, were also killed along with them. **Russia took the lives of an entire family.**

**On 4 February,** the Russian army launched a missile attack on the centre of Izyum in the Kharkiv region. The missile hit the administrative building. **Five people were killed** and 39 others were injured. There are three children among the wounded: a 6-year-old boy and two girls aged 14 and 16.



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**On 14 February,** the Russian armed forces attacked Kyiv region with a UAV. A Russian attack drone hit a shelter that protects the world from radiation from the destroyed 4th power unit of the **Chornobyl Nuclear Power Plant.**



**On 23 February,** Russia attacked Ukraine with 267 drones against Ukraine.

**On 26 February,** two people were killed in an enemy attack in Kyiv region. Tetyana Kulyk, a journalist with the Ukrinform News Agency, and her husband, Professor Pavlo Ivanchov, head of the Department of Surgery No. 3 at the Bohomolets National Medical University, were killed.
